



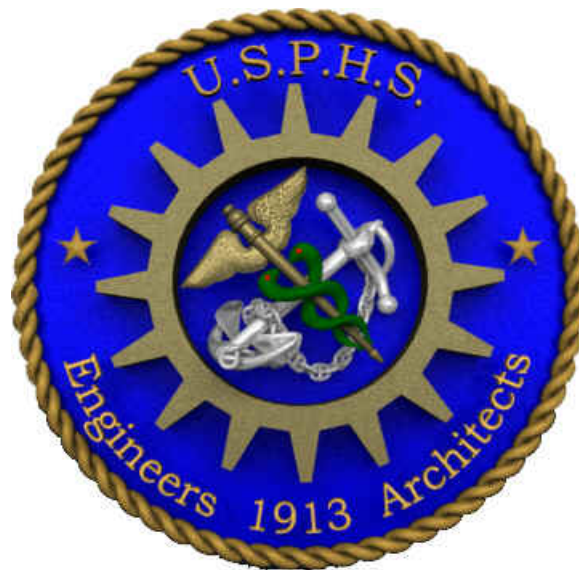

The First 30 Days of Commissioning Engineer Officers Should Complete the Following

Relocating: Household Goods Shipment

Contact your Agency Liaison. **Do not start shipping your goods until you have received orders.** Any expense incurred moving goods prior to receiving orders to do so you will have to be paid out-of-pocket. You will need to obtain form SF -1012 "Travel Voucher" from the program administrator. Before moving, be sure the following forms are completed: PHS 1662 "Request for Personnel Action-Commissioned Officer"; PHS-4013-1 "Application for Shipment of Household Goods- (Commissioned Officers)"; and SF 1203 "Government Bill of Lading".

Make several copies of your Call to Active Duty (CAD) Order

Have several copies of your CAD. It will be needed to obtain a military ID, access a military base for the first time, set-up medical records profile, register your vehicle, etc.

Obtain a Military Identification (ID) Card

The Military ID card is issued to PHS Officers and to eligible family members. ID cards must be renewed periodically (usually every four years and/or upon promotion). Confirm your information in DEERS is correct. DEERS is the data system that contains essential beneficiaries under the Uniformed Services Health Benefits Program. The ID card allows access to military bases and medical services. All PHS officers must complete Form DD-1172, "Application for Uniformed Services Identification Card- DEERS Enrollment".

Obtaining Health Benefits

PHS Officers are entitled to healthcare from any Uniformed Services Medical/ Military Treatment Facility (MTF) with a valid military ID. Healthcare will vary based on Officer's duty station. If your duty station zip code lies **within 60 miles** of a MTF, you must enroll in **TRICARE Prime** and obtain all routine and non-routine medical and dental care through the MTF. Active-duty officers are **not** eligible for TRICARE Extra or Standard. If your duty station is **60 miles outside the catchments area** of a MTF, you must enroll in **TRICARE Prime Remote**. The officer may obtain services from local physician where TRICARE Prime Remotes is accepted. Services coverage for Officers can differ from coverage offered to dependents. Check the website for benefits offered to Active Duty officers as well as dependents.

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Electronic Commissioned Corps Issuance System (eCCIS)

On 04 AUG 2006, the Commissioned Corps Personnel Manual (CCPM) was officially renamed the electronic Commissioned Corps Issuance System or eCCIS. The eCCIS constitutes the official medium for the issuance of policies, procedures, standards, instructions, and information governing personnel management of the Corps. Officers shall remain subject to the policies, procedures, and standards contained therein.

Montgomery G I Bill/ Education benefits

You can only opt for the GI Bill **once** in your life. You will receive the form with the rest of your initial paperwork. Think twice before declining. Many people have regretted not signing up. Once declined, the process is irreversible. Upon commissioning, you have an option to deduct \$100 a month for the first 12 months out of your paycheck. The funds come out of pretax salary. You can opt to purchase additional funds after the first year. The amount contributed affects the amount you may receive for education. These funds cannot be used until after two years from active duty date.

A will is a legal document that allows the officer to predetermine how his or her personal properties will be distributed after death. Before deploying, you may not have a chance to draft a will. Judge Advocate General's (JAG) Corps, located on most major military bases, will help you draw a will free of charge. All officers are encouraged to have a living will.

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BASIC READINESS

Dedicate your life to public service and to the mission of the Public Health Service. Have the commitment to the PHS mission to protect, promote, and advance the health and safety of the Nation. Help further enhance the healthcare system and strengthen the quality of healthcare services for the American people.

For more than two centuries, officers of the United States Public Health Service (USPHS) Commissioned Corps, one of the nation's seven uniformed services, have worked around the world to help in times of disaster and to provide day-to-day health care for underserved populations in the United States. Most recently, in response to Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, the Corps carried out the largest mobilization in its history. Such events have demonstrated the importance of maintaining and strengthening the nation's ability to respond to future national public health emergencies.

All Commissioned Officers of the U.S. Public Health Service are required to meet BASIC readiness standards. BASIC Readiness Standards are required to ensure officer readiness prior to deployment. The Office of Force Readiness and Deployment (OFRD) is responsible for establishing and maintaining readiness programs for the Corps and tracks the readiness status of individual officers. All Officers are provided user IDs and passwords to the OFRD websites. Officers are required to login and record readiness information and to login and complete readiness training modules. Basic Readiness Standards include the following requirements: complete immunizations, Annual Physical Fitness Test (APFT), Basic Life Support (BLS) Training, and OFRD's online training modules. All officers must join the OFRD List Server. The Office of Force Readiness and Deployment (OFRD) sends out very important information for officers regarding readiness and deployments and the list server is a primary communications tool. Officers may login to the OFRD Main Website for more detailed information on readiness, training and deployment opportunities.

The Commissioned Corps is to become trained in the Incident Command System (ICS), the National Incident Management System (NIMS), and the National Response Plan (NRP). In fact, across government, all individuals involved in emergency preparedness and response are required to complete four on-line training courses that have been prepared by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), and are widely accepted as the national standard. (These courses are in addition to current Corps readiness training requirements) A better understanding of the FEMA course topics will promote utilization of ICS concepts in leading, managing, and participating in an emergency response.

Consider developing a Mentoring relationship with a senior engineer officer to help with your career progression in the USPHS

The Engineer Professional Advisor Committee (EPAC) considers mentoring to be a vital component of career development and enhancement. A strong, viable mentoring program will not only strengthen the career potential of our architects and engineers, it is key to developing competent and confident leaders that will be faced with the public health challenges of the 21st century. The EPAC developed and implemented a pilot-mentoring program for USPHS architects and engineers in 1996. The pilot program has been evaluated and modified based on input from the participants. The revised program is now available to architects and engineers who feel they would benefit from being a mentor or a protégé.

OBC provides an introduction to the Commissioned Corps and also provides Officers a better understanding of military customs and courtesy, career development, promotions, leave, compensation, awards, resource utilization, and readiness and deployment. Registration for OBC is through your Agency liaison.

Enroll in Thrift Savings Plan (TSP)

Thrift Savings Plan (TSP) is a retirement savings and investment plan that offers the same type of savings and tax benefits that many private corporations offer their employees under so-called "401(k) plans." The TSP is a defined contribution plan. That is, the retirement income that you receive from the TSP depends upon how much you have contributed to your account and the earnings that have accrued on those contributions. The money that you invest in the TSP comes from pre-tax dollars and reduces your current taxable income. Your investments and earnings are not taxed until they are withdrawn. TSP for Uniformed Services (TSP-U-1) is different than one offered to Civilians (TSP-1). Be sure to enroll using the correct form. Prior federal employees may combine TSP-1 with the officer's TSP-U-1.

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The First 90 Days of Commissioning Engineer Officers Should Complete the Following

Officer's Electronic Personnel File (eOPF)

Establish and maintain your Officer's Electronic Personnel File (eOPF); keeping your eOPF up-to-date is critical to your career. Review and update your files (CV, Training, etc.) Every 6 months or as needed check the Promotion Information Review (PIR). Information in your file may be reviewed for promotion, awards and jobs by review boards.

Learn about the Engineer Benchmarks

The benchmarks are guideposts used by promotion boards as they review the service records of each officer consideration for promotion. **PLEASE NOTE** that the Promotion Board members are asked to exercise their professional judgment and discretion in the review and rating of each record. The benchmarks serve as a guide to the board members in their deliberations and are not criteria required for promotions. It is strongly suggested an Officer review the benchmarks as some may require time to obtain. Meeting the benchmark **does not** guarantee a promotion.

Promotion to O-4 and above is a competitive process.

Commissioned Officers' Effectiveness Report (COER)

COERS are web-based evaluations of your performance. They are intended to cover a Fiscal Year (October 1 thru September 30) each year. Be familiar with the evaluation criteria to be used for your COER. It is the officer's responsibility to ensure his/her Annual COER is transmitted by the prescribed deadline.

Service member's Civil Relief Act (SCRA) - Interest rate 6% protection

The Service member's Civil Relief Act (SCRA) allows you to request that the interest rate you pay on a debt incurred before you joined the military be reduced to 6% annually. To be eligible for the 6% cap, you must have incurred the debt before joining the service and your ability to pay must have been materially affected by military service. "Material effect" is a vague term that is often interpreted to involve mobilization for war or an extended deployment overseas. However, since the burden is on the creditor to prove a lack of "material effect", many creditors will grant the cap as a courtesy if properly requested. It is up to the service member to request the 6% cap; a sample letter is provided below. You should include a copy of your military orders and may be asked to include financial information in your request. If a creditor refuses to lower the interest rate on a qualified pre-service debt, you should see a NLSO Legal Assistance Attorney (on base). **This protection does not apply to government-backed college loans or to any debt acquired after joining the military.**

This is a letter requesting a reduction of the interest rate on my (account name & number), under the Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Relief Act (50 U.S.C. App. 526). As an active duty member of the uniformed services, I am entitled to maximum interest rate protection of 6% per annum on pre-service debt obligation. This interest rate protection applies during peacetime as well as time of war. There is no requirement of overseas service and the difference between the old rate and the 6% maximum is forgiven.

Attached you will find a copy of my enlistment contract and/or orders to active duty.
